Beloved *in* CHRIST,

In this inaugural impact report, we give thanks for the Lord's steady provision through a year of unprecedented challenge. In June 2025, Archbishop Wood cast a vision for the Province to cultivate "Good Ground" for mission. He called for revisions to our disciplinary canons, continued church planting, leadership development for bishops, a new clergy pipeline, and a wholehearted commitment to gospel focused evangelism.

Unfortunately, this year we have also had to navigate allegations, trials, and discord, including the Archbishop's pending trial and unresolved conflict with four episcopal members of the Chaplaincy. Simultaneously, we have repeatedly witnessed the promise of 2 Corinthians 9:10 that God faithfully "supplies seed to the sower and bread for food." In every season, God is attentive to our specific needs and graciously meets them. In these pages, I am grateful to share these gifts with you.

Despite these challenges, the "Good Ground" vision is bearing fruit. In June, the Provincial Council will vote to admit our first new diocese since 2020, the *Anglican Diocese of the Mid-South*, and our Average Sunday Attendance (ASA) maintained modest but steady growth with increases in both baptisms and confirmations. New data also reveals fresh insights into our ministry, showing that two-thirds of our churches offer adult education, half serve their local communities, and 45% support cross-cultural missions. It also reveals opportunities to grow in evangelism and outreach, and I am grateful

for the clarity to work together on these improvements. Our recent and continued strides to strengthen operations through centralized data and professionalized staffing will continue to foster institutional maturity over the coming year. I am also pleased to share that in partnership with the Society of Anglican Theologians, the Anglican Formation Network, and the College of Bishops, this fall we will begin work to develop shared minimum ordination standards and re-convene our 22-member Seminary consortium to strengthen clergy training and leadership across the Province.

This work is encouraging and fruitful, but it is not accomplished in isolation. I am deeply grateful for the Provincial team whose steadfast commitment through a demanding year deserves recognition. Your faithful support is also a tangible reminder of the Lord who provides. He is faithful to supply fresh seed for new ministry and bread to nourish us on our way. Through these encouraging reports of witness and stewardship, we celebrate His providential care across the Province. Thank you for laboring alongside us to advance His Kingdom.



We learned that we have good momentum in the areas of education and local outreach, and we see significant opportunities to grow in evangelism and global missions. This year, Always Forward, the Province's engine for church planting, trained 125 leaders through in-person, virtual, and diocesan training. It also provided a first-ever limited training for bishops.



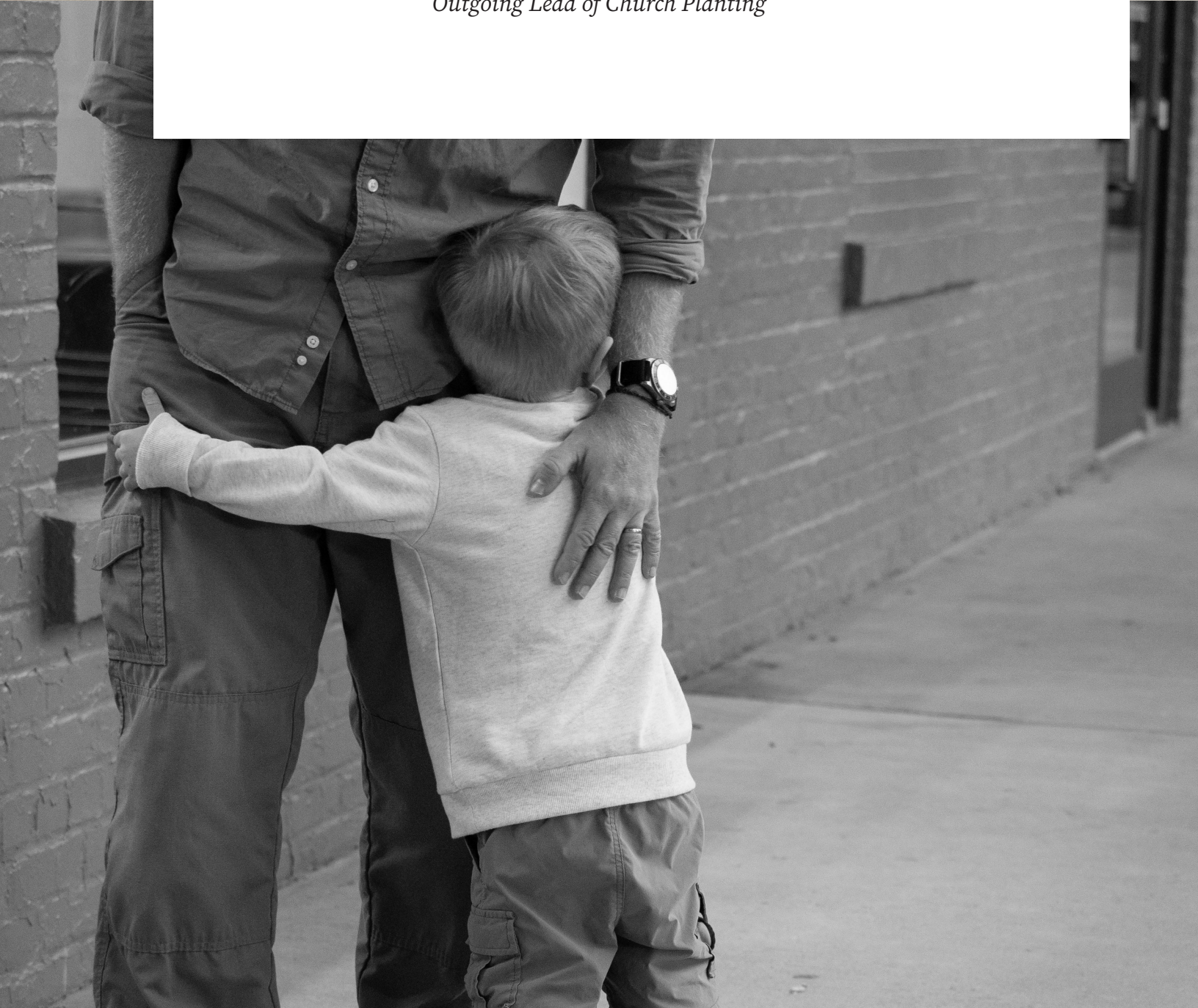
In January 2026, The Falls Church Anglican (Diocese of the Mid-Atlantic) became a fourth-generation planting church with the opening of Church of the Holy Comforter in Hyattsville, MD. The Falls Church planted Restoration Anglican in North Arlington, VA in 2009, which planted Church of the Incarnation in South Arlington, VA in 2015, which, in turn, planted Church of the Holy Comforter. Fewer than 7% of Protestant churches ever reproduce, so this is an exceptionally rare achievement attained by only a tiny fraction of all North American congregations. It indicates the missional ethic of multiplication has successfully outlived the founders to become a self-sustaining movement. We rejoice with The Falls Church Anglican and all of its daughter churches in reaching this amazing milestone.

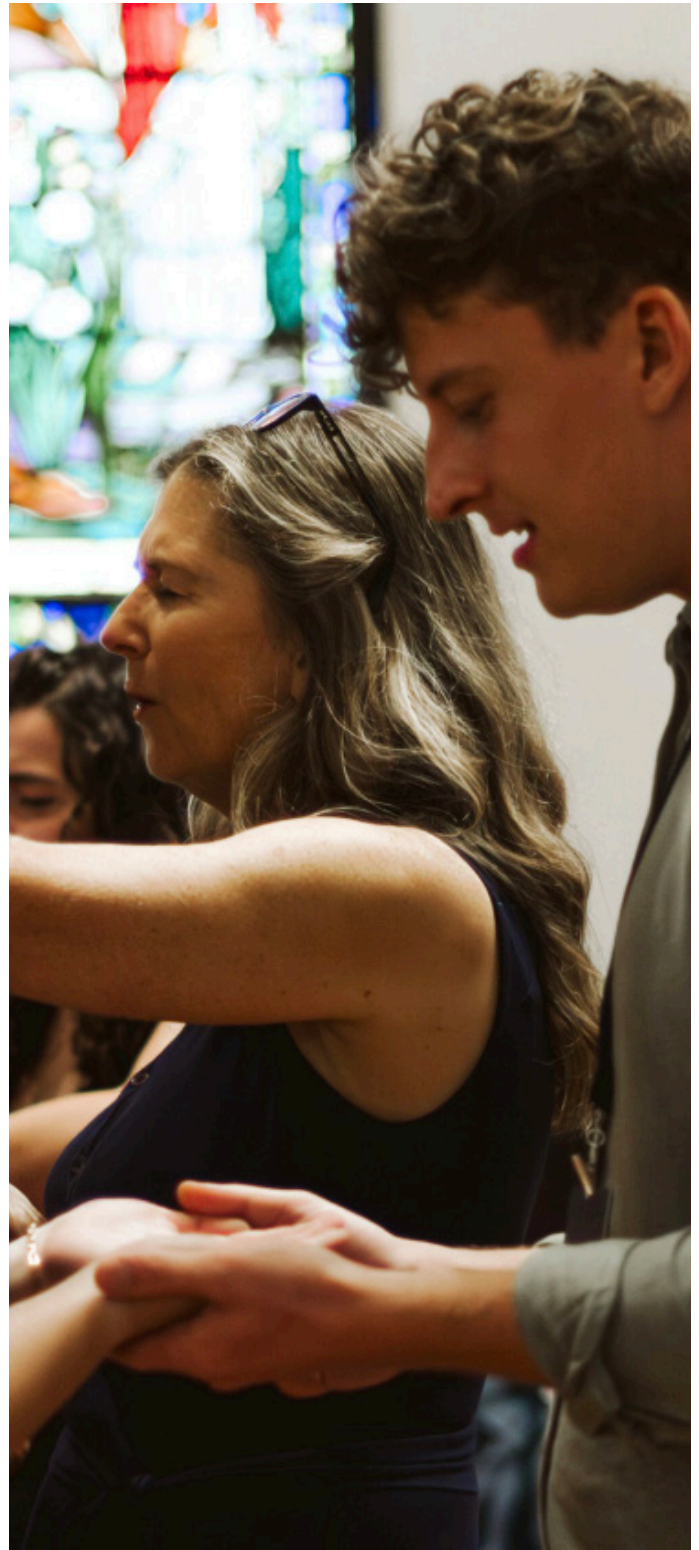
On Holy Saturday, parishioners at All Saints Cathedral in Amesbury, MA (Diocese of New England) made a gift to give to their neighbors. Drawing on the image of the garden from Genesis, and evoking themes of spring and new life, a small band of artist-evangelists of all ages painted small clay pots and delivered a tiny garden of fresh plants around the local town of Amesbury.

It was a way of sharing the love Jesus plants in our hearts and to remind us that every spring God offers signs of His promise that He is stronger than death. Every flower that blooms after winter says, “God keeps his promise: He brings life from death.” The accompanying card included Scripture from Isaiah 51:3, inviting every neighbor to celebrate spring and the promise of hope it brings.

The *Good Ground* vision was launched by Archbishop Steve Wood at Provincial Council in June 2025 and continued under Dean of the Province Bishop Julian Dobbs. It is a multi-year vision to cultivate the institutional, operational, and relational conditions for facilitating strong and healthy growth in mission across the ACNA.

Drawing on the rich agricultural metaphors found throughout scripture, the Good Ground concept highlights that local churches and dioceses are primarily involved in “seedwork” while the Province is tasked with “soilwork.” Seedwork is the direct, hands-on ministry of planting churches and tending mature disciples, whereas “soilwork” focuses on nurturing the conditions necessary for natural growth to occur. Good Ground focuses provincial activity around five strategic pillars:

Every year, the Province articulates key measures within each pillar and selects one primary strategic deliverable to orient the Provincial team’s daily work and foster a spirit of professionalism and accountability. Our *Key Milestones* highlight some of the goals we’ve accomplished, and *Looking Ahead* to FY27 outlines our plans for this year.

Over the past 12 months, the Province achieved significant milestones across its five pillars of growth. These accomplishments provide the robust infrastructure and collaborative partnerships necessary to develop and equip healthy leaders and healthy churches to reach the lost and welcome them home.



HEALTHY FUNDING

Fostering Strategic and Sustainable Stewardship

- *Established a Legacy Fund:* Launched the ACNA Stewardship Legacy Fund to provide sustained support for church planting, and leadership and congregational development across the province for generations to come.
- *Advanced Clergy Financial Education and Support:* Developed a nine-module financial literacy program for clergy and helped fund the creation of 13 new diocesan Emergency Care Funds to support clergy facing financial hardship.
- *Modernized Financial Systems:* Transitioned to a modernized financial ecosystem, establishing robust internal controls and digital platforms designed to support the growing scale of our mission.
- *Strengthened Financial Foundation:* Achieved fundraising targets and bolstered reserves, resulting in a strong cash position for long-term stability and the agility needed to respond to emerging ministry opportunities.



HEALTHY INFRASTRUCTURE

Providing Reliable Data, Systems, and Staffing

- *Implemented Centralized Data System:* Integrated the Province's first-ever central CRM system to track and manage data and pipelines, increasing visibility and insight to more effectively discern how to serve our dioceses and churches.
- *Strengthened Diocesan Connectivity:* Developed recurring professional networks that connect functional leads across dioceses, providing a collaborative space for leaders in safeguarding, communications, and administration to solve common challenges and share best practices.
- *Enhanced IT Operations and Security:* Fortified the Province's digital infrastructure by establishing comprehensive security protocols





and a password management system to protect provincial data.

- *Created Searchable Ministry Database:* Developed an accessible, centralized ministry database to enable leaders to quickly identify resources and connect with specialized ministries across the ACNA.
- *Amplified Congregational Reporting:* Improved the annual reporting process to capture high-quality data, empowering the Province with the insights needed to better support churches and dioceses.



HEALTHY LEADERSHIP

- *Inaugurated Episcopal Orientation and Training:* Hosted the Province's first-ever New Bishops Orientation and dedicated training intensives to equip new and existing episcopal leaders for the unique demands of their office.
- *Launched Regional Working Groups:* Established monthly episcopal Regional Working Groups to facilitate peer-to-peer localized collaboration on high-priority issues.
- *Enhanced Episcopal Vetting Standards:* Developed a new Episcopal Election Customary to strengthen the vetting process for bishops, ensuring the highest standards of integrity and fitness for leadership.
- *Launched the Anglican Formation Network:* Initiated a landmark five-year, \$10 million partnership grant with Trinity Anglican Seminary to strengthen theological formation and leadership pipelines across the Province.
- *Multiplied Pastoral Residency Programs:* Always Forward's Residency Builder Events have prompted the creation of at least 12 new pastoral residencies across the ACNA.



HEALTHY GOVERNANCE

- *Advanced Title IV Reform:* Launched a comprehensive review and reform of our Title IV canons, engaging multiple stakeholders to enhance the integrity, transparency, and effectiveness of our ecclesiastical disciplinary processes.
- *Implemented Best Practice Governance Reforms:* Developed and adopted more than 85 clear policies and charters for governance to ensure organizational excellence, clear accountability, and alignment with the mission of the Church.
- *Established a Standard Reporting Framework:* Developed a clear, comprehensive ACNA workflow for receiving and responding to misconduct reports, supported by the appointment of a new Provincial Vice Chancellor for Safeguarding.
- *Centralized Resources and Reporting List:* Launched a Safeguarding Leadership network, a best-practice resource hub, and the first Diocesan Reporting Contact List to streamline reporting and ensure diocese alignment to canonical safeguarding standards.



HEALTHY PARTNERSHIPS

- *Strengthened Strategic Ministry Alliances:* Formally defined and deepened collaborative relationships with seven Provincial Ministry Partners, aligning our shared goals to more effectively serve the mission of the Church.
- *Established Formal Affiliation Pathway:* Created a clear and consistent channel for 32+ Anglican ministries to become formally affiliated with the Province.
- *Launched Provincial Leadership Networks:* Successfully transitioned the Next Gen Leadership Initiative (NGLI) into a volunteer network structure, designed to facilitate meaningful connection, resource sharing, and skill-building among key affinity groups.

► The Clergy Financial Wellness Initiative (CFWI) provided matching grants to 13 dioceses to establish Clergy Care Funds for leaders facing acute financial challenges. Here are some examples of vital provision made possible through these funds:

- *The Diocese of the Southwest* funded urgent medical and dental care for two priests and bridged a rent shortfall for a retired priest facing rising costs.
- *The Diocese of the Upper Midwest* covered emergency medical expenses for a priest whose wife suffered a stroke during an international pilgrimage.
- *The Diocese of the Rocky Mountains* provided vital respite for a weary pastor, funded essential car repairs for a bi-vocational planter, and assisted a clergy family with a downpayment in a high-cost area.

We’re Adding a Diocese!

At Provincial Council in June 2026 the Missionary District of the Mid-South, a ministry of the Anglican Diocese of the South, will apply to become the ACNA’s newest, 28th diocese to expand the ACNA footprint across new regions of the Southeast and Lower Midwest.



For more than 15 years, Church of the Redeemer (Anglican Diocese of Pittsburgh) in St. Paul, MN, worshiped on Sunday afternoons in rented spaces across the city. After years of prayer and a fruitless search for land or space to purchase, last summer a nearby congregation, St. Stephanus Lutheran Church (LCMS), reached out to Redeemer's leadership, informing them that their congregation had voted to close. When Redeemer toured the building and inquired about the price, St. Stephanus's board replied that they would accept a purchase price of \$1! As of January 2026, Redeemer is now worshipping on Sunday mornings in their new permanent home, the site of more than 135 years of Christian ministry in the Frog-town neighborhood of St. Paul.

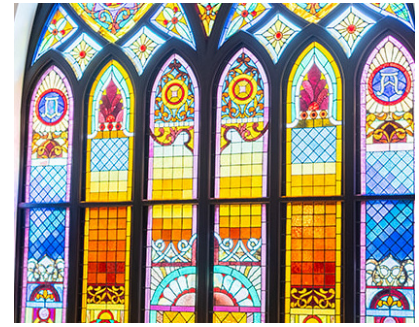
Fr. Jim Barton planted St. Philip's Anglican Church in Tuscaloosa, AL (Anglican Diocese of the South) in 2024. In the heart of the university district, the Lord provided a unique and surprising mission field as believers from Nigeria, Ghana, Kenya, Myanmar, and Belize joined the young plant, creating a vibrant and distinctive witness. Now in its second year, St. Philip's serves as a thriving hub for the University of Alabama, proving that a new work can reflect the full reach of the global Church family.

In 2021, Fr. Richard Tarsitano planted Trinity Anglican (Diocese of the Central States - REC) in Connersville, Indiana, a struggling rust-belt town with 13,000 residents. Over the past five years, Trinity was able to



purchase a beautiful historic church at the center of town for just \$40,000 and continues to see healthy, steady growth among families drawn to the parish's focus on deep catechesis and traditional liturgy.

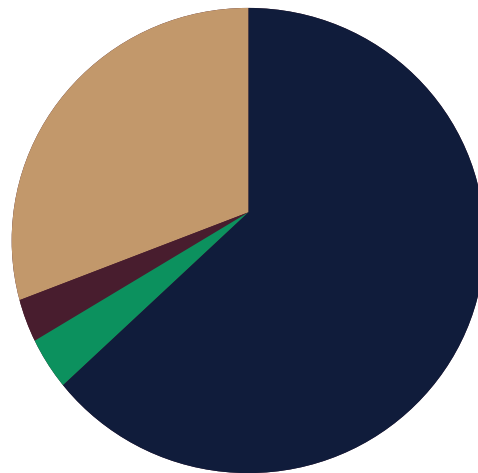

The historic financial stability the Province enjoyed in the 2025-26 ministry year is a testament to the extraordinary generosity of our donors, dioceses, philanthropic partners and the disciplined stewardship of our leadership. We extend our heartfelt thanks to all of the many donors who helped us reach our goals this year! We are so deeply grateful for those who faithfully support the mission of the ACNA.



In 2025, ACNA churches baptized 3,445 children and reported reaching more than 118,000 children and youth aged 0-18 through ministry this year.

In February 2026, the ACNA Student Leadership Network (SLN) hosted its annual youth ministry conference in Austin, TX, serving 26 youth ministers from eight dioceses across the province to share best practices and identify opportunities for collaboration and growth.

‘what’s next’, and we feel excited to explore that together. We can’t wait to gather for more learning and connection next year!” said Courtney Allen, Lay Pastor of Family Ministries at Mission Chattanooga (Anglican Diocese of the South).

In 2026, the Anglican Diocese of the Great Lakes (ADGL) advanced its efforts to create accessible, illustrated versions of liturgies from the 2019 Book of Common Prayer (BCP), specifically for early and intermediate readers, as well as children with developmental or cognitive

differences. These formational resources are made possible through a \$1.2 million Lilly Endowment Inc. grant the diocese won in 2025 in partnership with the ACNA Catechesis Task Force.

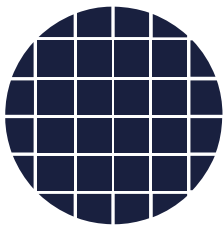
Building on the successes of this year, we enter a new ministry season confident that beyond necessary provision, the Lord “will also supply and increase your store of seed and will enlarge the harvest of your righteousness” (2 Corinthians 9:10).

Here is a glimpse of some key ways we are cultivating *Good Ground* through 2027.



Elevate Clergy Financial Literacy

We are expanding our Clergy Financial Wellness training cohorts into three adaptable tracks to reach leaders at every career stage. Our goal is to equip at least 10% of active clergy by the end of 2027 to master their personal finances and lead parish financial operations with confidence.



Build A Leadership Formation Pipeline

As part of the Anglican Formation Network (AFN) grant project, we will be working with Trinity Seminary and more than 40 other partners, seminaries, and church-based programs to create and launch a hub of formational opportunities with reliable data architecture that invites clergy and lay members to explore next steps in their development and while allowing us visibility into who are leaders are, how they grow, and where they are engaged.



Bridge the Campus Ministry Gap

This year, the ACNA will launch the Anglican Campus Fellowship to establish a foundational presence in higher education, foster collegiate discipleship, and promote vocational discernment with the strategic target of offering ministry on ten pilot campuses by Fall 2027. This model engages the local parish, provides a bridge between youth ministry and adult discipleship, and strengthens the pipeline of future ACNA leaders.



Support Dioceses in Safeguarding

Throughout 2026-27 the ACNA will develop and provide comprehensive training, resources, and institutional support to equip dioceses to maintain a culture of accountability, transparency, and pastoral care. Pending ratification, the ACNA will also oversee the rollout of revised disciplinary canons (Title IV), providing support to diocesan staff and bishops as they seek to align with the new procedures.



Recover Multiplication as a Movement

The Provincial office is reimagining Provincial Council 2027 to create a new annual mission-centric gathering focused on church planting and revitalization. Rooted in our Anglican Tradition, this event will work with Ministry Partners, Leadership Networks, and Affiliated Ministries to unify the Province around a shared vision for gospel expansion.



In the fall of 2025, the Special Jurisdiction for the Armed Forces and Chaplaincy (SJAFC) underwent a significant leadership transition and successfully integrated its daily operations into the Provincial Office. This realignment fosters deeper institutional alignment and shared accountability between the Province and its dedicated 154 chaplains.

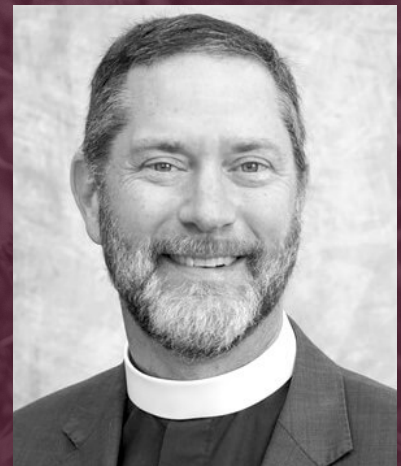
The Rt. Rev. Jerome "Jay" R. Cayangyang, Captain, Chaplain Corps, United States Navy Reserve was elected to succeed Bishop Derek Jones as Bishop of the Armed Forces and Chaplaincy on September 25, 2025 and was installed on February 14, 2026. Commander Chris McCarthy, U.S. Navy (Ret.) serves as its Chief of Staff.

Chaplain Highlights

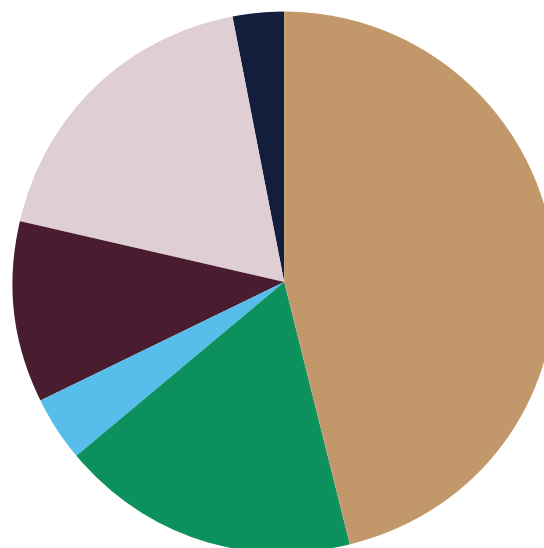
- *Diverse Service:* Our ever-growing roster of chaplains serve in the Armed Forces (active duty and reserve), the Department of Veterans Affairs, hospitals, hospice care, and prisons, with a growing cohort of Commissioned Lay Chaplains.
- *Global Presence:* ACNA chaplains reside across the United States, including Alaska and Hawaii, and are stationed at international bases in Germany, Spain, and Japan.
- *Operational Readiness:* Our chaplains are currently deployed on bases, ships, and aircraft carriers in support of critical missions around the world.
- *Historic Leadership:* The ACNA currently provides unprecedented leadership at the highest levels of the United States military, with Rear Admiral Carey Cash serving as the Chief of Chaplains for the Navy and Col. Rich West serving as the Acting Chief of Chaplains for the Army.

Over more than three years, 15+ volunteers dedicated countless hours, prayerful deliberation, and exceptional legal skills to revise Title IV to ensure a practical and well-ordered disciplinary foundation for the Province. We are deeply grateful to the Governance Task Force, including its former Chair Bishop Phil Ashley. We want to especially recognize and extend our sincere thanks to the current GTF Chair Rev. Canon Andrew Rowell for his sacrificial leadership during this vital work over the past year. Thank you!



The FY27 budget (July 1, 2026-June 30, 2027) footprint has grown from \$2.9M to \$4.5M. The increase is primarily due to more unified reporting within the general operating budget to include all grant initiatives and special projects including the *Anglican Formation Network (AFN)*, the *Clergy Financial Wellness Initiative (CFWI)*, and the Special Jurisdiction for the Armed Forces and Chaplaincy (SJAFC). This provides full mission visibility and unparalleled accountability to the Province.



Diversified Revenue Streams for Durable Stability

A healthy non-profit is a diversified one. Our 2027 outlook is secured by a robust mix of revenue streams that protect our long-term future.

FY27 Budget Principles and Priorities

As we enter a new phase of organizational maturity, the FY27 budget includes intentional investments in our outward-facing presence to support sustainable growth:

- \$200,000 increased pledged giving from our dioceses reflects growth and deepening alignment around shared priorities.
- \$100,000 allocated to Ministry Partners ensures our outward giving grows in proportion to our own resources.
- \$200,000 allocated to help launch the Anglican Campus Fellowship.

Additional investment in the following areas allow the province to continue professionalizing to better support its dioceses and churches in mission:

- Fundraising and Development
- Digital Communication (including a website redesign)
- Research and Data Analysis
- Training and Resources for Safeguarding

This integrated financial framework powers our mission: equipping healthy leaders and churches to reach North America with Christ’s transforming love.

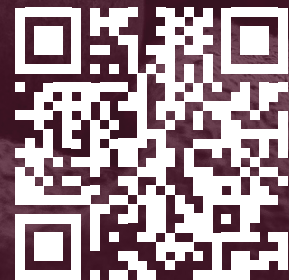

In Fall 2024, St. Andrew’s Anglican, a church plant in Frederick, MD, began meeting in a small chapel for weekly Sunday services. At that point the church plant had about 30 congregants, but they grew and were soon approaching the chapel’s 96-person seating capacity. Inspired by Philippians 4:19, they began praying every Tuesday at 4:19 PM for a larger space. They made arrangements to rent from a larger church, but the lease did not start until May. On Easter Sunday, April 5, 2006 the congregation gathered outdoors to accommodate 100+ people, and had planned to return to the small chapel through April, but learned that the chapel was going to be without restrooms for several weeks! The Lord provided by allowing St. Andrew’s to secure their new space two weeks early. In answer to their prayers, they held their first regular service in a new space on April 19 (4/19) with 108 people in attendance!
